# **OVERVIEW**

## **Our School**

Located in Alice Springs, Araluen Christian College is set at the bottom of the picturesque MacDonnell Ranges. Araluen Christian College offers programs from Transition to Year 9 and has approximately 114 students enrolled. In 2023 there were four classes in primary school and two in secondary school.

Araluen Christian College's vision is "to be Christian communities, learning together to live life as God intended, offering hope to the world" and is supported by our mission statement – "Araluen Christian College partners with families, guiding each child's journey of living and learning, providing hope in Christ for the future".

### **Our Students**

In 2023, Araluen Christian College had 114 students enrolled. The demographics of the College was indicative of its locale and surrounding demographics. The 114 students enrolled consisted of 56% boys and 44% girls. Indigenous student accounted for 20% of the overall student population. Students with a language background other than English consisted of 28% of those students enrolled. Araluen Christian College also has a growing number of students from African and other migrant backgrounds.

Araluen Christian College enrolments are largely drawn from Araluen, Larapinta, Undoolya, Flynn, Ciccone, Braitling, Ilparpa, Sadadeen and Kilgariff, which are remote/regional suburbs of Alice Springs which are predominately low in socio-economic status. The College has an Index of Community Sociao-Economic Advantage (ICSEA) value of 991 with a student distribution of 18% (low), 32%, 34% (middle), and 15% (upper).

Araluen Christian College enrolment is predominantly low to middle income families. The increasingly diverse demographic has 20 % indigenous enrolment and 25% from a language background other than English. Of

this, is English (non-indigenous) the dominant culture followed by African/Sudanese culture, and First Nations culture.

1.7 % of students at Araluen Christian College are from families currently serving within the Australian Defence Forces.

The College has an Education Support unit with dedicated staff working to support student learning needs. In 2023, 25 students had an Education Assistance Plan (EAP).

### **Our Community**

Araluen Christian College has maintained strong relationships with the local community of Alice Springs. The College participates in local events including, ANZAC Day parades and interschool sporting events. Parent engagement with the College was regular with ongoing attendance at assemblies, Book Day Parades and volunteer assistance in our school classrooms. Parents and staff regularly communicated via the Compass LMS App and this was the core portal for communication between parents and school staff. As one of the 6 schools that comprise NT Christian Schools, Araluen Christian College engaged strongly with professional learning. In 2023, our College staff attended the annual 'Over the Top' conference in Darwin where teachers, TA's and admin staff were able to network with other Christian teachers and engage in up to date professional learning that was then brought back to our communities. Araluen Christian College also actively promoted regular connections with community organisations such as Scripture Union, who regularly organised youth events in the College. This connection was a key component to the schools approach to addressing student wellbeing. Jeans for Genes day and other charity days were also key moments on the school calendar where students could engage with causes that support our local community.







# **PRINCIPAL REPORT**

2023 was an enjoyable year at Araluen Christian College. It was a year in which we began to sow the seeds for new growth across several areas of the college.

The first of these areas was facilities development. Term 4 of 2023 ushered in a newly refurbished Amenities Block in the Junior School Area. This refurbishment transformed these Junior Amenities with cubicles for both male and female students, hand dryers and sensor energy saving lights that time out when not in use. Additionally, there was an enclosed space created for the Wood Technology Programs, newly constructed flagpoles that signify inclusivity of our First Nations people, more security screens installed, an upgrade of our PA and Bell system and new furniture purchased for our Year 3 and 4 classrooms. These markers provide a view of the ongoing facilities renewal plan in action.

In 2023 we planned for and began an implementation of a new leadership structure for college and a review of the positive rewards systems for the students. This structure aimed to provide focus for staff in our key areas and to align to our college's strategic direction. We introduced an Assistant Principal role with a clear link to our Middle School students, VET opportunities and NCCD processes. Additionally, all staff were engaged in the PEACEWISE for Kids & Youths Professional Development that will drive consistent language and processes for developing a culture of Peace at Araluen in 2024 and beyond. These shifts saw the college take bigger steps forward in a range of areas, particularly in our teaching and learning goals.

2023 saw the college continue to focus on crafted formational learning and coaching across our teaching and learning. In our professional learning communities staff worked on developing student oriented professional learning goals that allowed them to focus on developing their professional skills in a way that would benefit student learning. Staff embraced this process and there was ongoing growth.

To close the year, we celebrated the awesome work of our staff and students. Highlights of the year were the Book Week Parade, Weekly Chapels organised by our students, Tuckshop reopening and supported by our own Food Technology students and our Celebration Night which saw a growth in parental engagement across the board. These are beautiful moments of seeing our College's Servant Hear mentality and God's enduring faithfulness in action.

# **ANNUAL ACTION PLAN**

#### Community and Culture

- Opening up of CANVAS to middle school parents
- Events for the College community will be run once per term

#### Finance and Resources

- Library courtyard developed int a community space with seating and shelter
- Primary toilets refurbished

For 2024, there are still a number of goals that are yet to be achieved and these will need refining at the start of 2024 as the new Action Plan is reviewed. Strong emphasis is to be placed on feedback from staff and parents.

While not all key overarching outcomes were identified, elements of each were achieved as listed above. The work that has been undertaken has had a positive impact on the wellbeing of the school community and is starting a shift towards improved academic outcomes. More evidence needs to be collected regarding the College's academic performance and professional learning tailored to this in order to assist with meeting the student learning targets.

For 2024, a strong focus on community engagement is needed alongside addressing student learning outcomes through the use of evidence and research. Professional learning needs to be tailored to this and the establishment of Professional Learning Communities (PLC's) and Professional Growth Plans are an important tool that the College is looking to implement early in 2024.
